The visitor center and house will be open Friday through Monday from 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Tours of the historic house will be held once an hour, on the half hour, beginning at 10:30 am; the last tour of the day will begin at 3:30 pm.



National Flag Day

On June 14th, National Flag Day honors Old Glory and commemorates the adoption of the United States flag on June 14, 1777.

Mabel Hyer Griep

She designed the original Dayton flag and is resting peacefully at Woodland Cemetery.

It was through the directors at the Greater Dayton Association (GDA) that a flag design was submitted to the Dayton City Commission for adoption by ordinance and it was on August 2, 1917.

On June 11, 1916 in an article from the Dayton Daily News the flag was described as "distinctive in colors" and that the GDA recommended it "for all future use in local decorations." The article went on to say that the colors of the flag were blue, white and gold, with the gold being of a deep orange. The colors were not meant to represent anything thing in particular but it was stated that the blue could mean loyalty; white, civic righteousness; and the gold the agricultural resources or the wealth of the city. The flag consisted of three vertical bars: orange, white, orange. On the field of white an "aeroplane in flight and the word "Dayton" within the circle."

"The use of the aeroplane was governed by the idea that the science of aerial flight typifies the greatest advance in man's progress and that therefore Dayton is in the front rank of progressive cities."

FLAG DAYS PLACED ON LIST FOR CITY

Because there is apparently some haziness as to when the American flag should and should not be exhibited in public, Brooks H. Harmon, secretary of the Dayton Retail Merchants association, Saturday compiled a list of the days on which it should be used. These are Pebruary 12, Lincoln's birthday; February 22, Washington's birthday; May 30, Memorial day; and June 14, Flag day; July 4, Independence day; Labor day in September and November 11, Armistice day.

The flag was designed by Mabel Hyer, a member of Steele High School graduating class of 1914. By 1916, Miss Hyer was working as an assistant in the art department at Steele.

In April 1942, Mayor Frank Krebs appealed to the patriotism of Daytonians by urging those with the American flag to display them on Army Day, April 6th. Brooks Harmon (mentioned in the above article and still secretary of the Dayton Retail Merchants Association) was urging those with the Dayton flag to display it as well.

"We are in troublesome times and our army means far more to us than ever. It is the least we can do to show our appreciation, our loyalty and our patriotism by displaying the American flag in front of our homes and places of business," stated Krebs.
